FIRST and ONLY EDITION, variant issue. This work contains chapters on mapmaking for Europe, Asia, Africa and America, as well as later chapters describing each of these four "partes do Globo." Father António Carvalho da Costa (1650-1715), a native of Lisbon, secular priest, astronomer, cartographer and geographer, also wrote the *Corographia portuguesa*, 3 volumes, 1706-12, and various other works on geography, astronomy and mathematics.

Another, presumably later issue of the present work contains additional licenses and a taxation statement dated 12 through 19 August on the sixth preliminary leaf recto, with the 4-page "Index dos Capitulos" continuing on the verso, the seventh preliminary leaf recto and verso, and the final preliminary leaf recto, causing the final preliminary leaf verso to be blank. In the present version, the final license is dated 25 January 1686, appearing on the fifth preliminary leaf verso (as in the other version), but with the sixth preliminary blank. The 4-page "Index" occupies the final 2 preliminary leaves, with the signature "ttiii" appearing on the seventh preliminary leaf recto. In the presumably later issue, despite being placed differently, the "Index" is in the same setting of type, except that the signature "ttiii" has been removed.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. Very nicely printed on an excellent quality paper. Introduction and discussion in English by Cortesão. The work includes reproductions of several early portolan charts, plus the exhaustive study and the highly significant bibliography and index. In addition to the 1424 chart, the text includes discussions of later portolans.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this elaborate textbook on the construction of telescopes for use by students at Portugal's naval observatory. The work makes use of principles of mathematics, optics, physics, vision, etc.

Mateus Valente do Couto (1770-1848), a native of Macapá in Pará, near the mouth of the Amazon, was a distinguished physician and mathematician, Director of the Portuguese Naval Observatory and a member of the Academia Real das Sciencias de Lisboa. His parents were Portuguese, natives of Mazagão. He left a number of scientific works.

First published 2004. Recipes for food and drinks that appear in the works by Eça de Queirós. This is essentially a cookbook full of traditional recipes from Portuguese cuisine, all very accessible for readers ranging from the staples of Portuguese cookery (*empadas*, *linguas de gato*, *maça assada*) to more exotic dishes such as roasted peacock (pp. 128-9). Each recipe refers to the work in Eça de Queirós' oeuvre where it is described, referred to, or enjoyed.

FIRST EDITION. Important documentary and statistical compilation. In 1810 Wellington, foreseeing that much of Portugal would be devastated by the French, recommended that Parliament supply aid. In 1811 Parliament voted a sum not exceeding £100,000. Pages 20-59 comprise the report of the Committee that traveled to Portugal to gather and cross-check reports of the situation there: it includes not only the statistics they gathered, but their evaluation of those statistics. It is followed by supporting documents and tables setting out the distribution of the funds.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this excellent facsimile of a most valuable manuscript of the Portuguese discoveries, the original of which is housed in the library of the Academia das Ciências de Lisboa. The facsimile of the manuscript is preceded by an introduction by Luís de Albuquerque, in which he provides a useful list of all related manuscripts, followed by a comparison of the information provided about each fleet in this manuscript and in the *Livro de Lisuarte de Abreu*, the only similar work known. Pages 15-25 contain a transcription of all text in the manuscript, organized, as is the manuscript itself, chronologically by the years of the fleets. The main text contains color representations of the ships that made up the various fleets, often with the names of the captains. Several of the fleets stopped in Brazil on the outward voyage, beginning with that of Pedro Alvares Cabral in 1500, making this a crucial document for the early history of that country.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this collection of essays on the European identity crisis of 1668 and its repercussions into the eighteenth century. The essays focus on overseas expansion of both Portugal and Spain, the monarchies of both countries, and literature from the period. The essays span topics from the early 17th century through the 18th century.

First and Only Edition in Portuguese; judging from the caption title and the note on f. 2r, Mascarenhas translated Moulay Ismaïl's will from a Spanish edition, but compiled the facts of the sultan's life from other sources.

Moulay Ismail Ibn Sharif (1643 or 1645-1727) was one of the most famous figures in Moroccan history. After becoming the second sultan in the Alaouite dynasty in 1672, he fought a series of battles to persuade the Ottoman Turks to respect Moroccan independence and captured Tangier and other important seaports from the Spanish and English, earning himself the nickname "The Warrior King."

The prologue gives details of Muley Ismail's ancestry and his actions, which included the murder of thousands, heavy taxes, the acquisition of hundreds of concubines and the siring of hundreds of children, and his transfer of the capital to Meknes, where he was building a huge new city and royal complex. The testament (ff. 2v-4v) includes provisions for his slaves, concubines, children, Christian slaves, the Franciscans at Meknes, counterfeiters, thieves, vagabonds, prostitutes, and Jews. At the end is a glossary of Arabic terms such as *alcaçova, bamarkan, janezes*, and *xarife*.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. The *Inventos*, written in the form of a dialogue between a fictitious stranger and Moura Portugal, contains many references to places in Portugal, Africa, Asia and South America. The chapter entitled "Dialogo sobre varias cousas da America" (pp. 177-204) begins with a discussion of Portuguese and Spanish claims to Colonia do Sacramento, and the line of demarcation between Spanish and Portuguese colonies in South America (pp. 177-88). The speakers go on to discuss the means of communication between Matto Grosso, Grão Pará and Rio de Janeiro, mentioning travel by various rivers and the journey of Antonio Rolim (pp. 188-204).

The final chapter is on how to determine whether there is gold in land alongside a river, before digging mine shafts (pp. 207-17). Subjects of other chapters include water-wheels, improving the speed of boats on the Tejo, and how to increase the firing power of artillery without increasing the amount of gunpowder used.

Moura Portugal (b. 1702 in Moimenta da Beira, near Gouveia) traveled abroad for 8 years learning about foreign improvements in science and the arts. In 1760, having returned to Portugal, he was accused of treason to the Portuguese crown, and thrown into the Forte da Junqueira. During the 16 years before his death there in 1776, he filled 28 manuscript notebooks with his discoveries and projects. This volume contains all that could be salvaged of them; it was published after through the efforts of Antonio Ribeiro Saraiva. Many of these ideas, such as the one for transporting lumber from coastal areas to Lisbon and various inland cities, were of great commercial use.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION, a COMPLETE RUN of this rare Portuguese periodical containing the first appearance of *O Crime do Padre Amaro*, **one of the best and most important novels ever written**, the first novel written entirely by Eça de Queiroz, and certainly one of his most important works. (*O Mistério da estrada de Sintra*, written in collaboration with Ramalho Ortigão, had appeared in 1870.) Eça had serious disagreements with the editors of the *Revista*, Antero de Quental and Batalha Reis, regarding corrections to his work, and was very dissatisfied with the published result. He substantially revised it for the first edition in book form, published in 1876.

The review was bilingual, and intended for an audience in Spain as well as in Portugal. The first volume of the present collection contains the issues intended for the Spanish market, with the peculiarity of Eça's novel appearing simultaneously for the first time in that language, as *El crimen de Padre Amaro*. Some other texts by Portuguese authors appear in Spanish in these issues, while in Portuguese for the issues intended for the Portuguese market. Other texts appear in Portuguese in both issues, while the texts by Spanish authors appear in Spanish in both issues. Where the language is unchanged, the settings of type are also unchanged. The wrappers, while in the same format, list the contents on the versos of the front wrappers in the language they appear, while "anno" becomes "año", "summario" becomes "sumario", "primeiro" becomes "primero", etc.

The *Revista Occidental* includes works by such noted Portuguese authors as Antero de Quental, Manuel de Arriaga, Luciano Cordeiro, Gonçalves Crespo, Oliveira Martins and Gomes Leal, and also works in Spanish by Cánovas del Castillo, Pi y Margall, Jacinto Octavio Picón and Patricio de la Escosura.

The rarity of this periodical, especially with all the original wrappers present, has led to some confusion among bibliographers regarding the number of issues and the dates of publication - doubtless mostly because only the original printed wrappers indicate the fascicle number and date of publication. The only published record of an actual copy we have been able to locate, sold in the Fernandes Thomaz sale in 1912, has the same dates of publication as this copy and the same number of issues, and is described as "collecção completa." Two copies handled by us in the early 1990s, one sold in the summer of 2001, and one sold in the summer of 2012, all had the same collation as the present one , but contained all the issues for the Portuguese market.

Provenance: Frederico de Almeida (1889-196?) was probably the best Portuguese bookbinder of his era. In 1926 he founded "A Carmelita" bindery on the Calçada do Sacramento,



Lisboa. In 1940 he abandoned "A Carmelita" to work in an office he already owned, on Rua António Maria Cardoso, 31, ao Chiado. Among his illustrious clients were the Count of Barcelona, ex-King Umberto of Italy, and a sister of King Farouk of Egypt.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. While the abilities of the Dominican Fr. Lucas de Santa Catarina as an historian have been denigrated, this is an ambitiously printed volume, and the first book in Portuguese to attempt a history of the Knights of Malta. It is nicely produced, in the same format and with some of the same, or similar illustration and decoration as other books printed for the Academia Real de História in Lisbon at about this time when Brazilian gold and diamonds were enriching the Portuguese crown, including what is virtually a companion volume, the *Supplemento historico, ou memorias, e noticias da celebre Ordem dos Templarios, para a Historia da admiravel Ordem de Nosso Senhor Jesu Christo* by Alexandre Ferreira, which the same printer produced in Lisbon the following year.

The present copy, and another sold by us in 2004 had the engraved emblem on the title page signed by de Rochefort and dated 1736; in another, sold by us in 2012, this emblem did not have any signature or date. In the copy sold in 2004 the frontispiece was dated 1728; in the present copy there is no date on the frontispiece, as was the case with

the copy sold in 2012. There are one, or at the most two copies recorded with an unnumbered errata leaf at the end not present here, and never seen by us on the market. Aside from Azevedo Samodães, Ameal (these the same copy), and Ávila Perez (quite possibly also the same copy), none of the other references mention this errata leaf. Curiously, it is said to be titled in Latin, while the rest of the book is in Portuguese.

A native of Lisbon, Fr. Lucas de Santa Catarina (1660-1740) entered the Dominican Order at Benfica, 1680. Given the post of cronista-geral of his order, Fr. Lucas was charged with the responsibility of completing the *História de São Domingos* left by Frei Luís de Sousa. He was one of 50 selected by King João V as a founding member of the Academia Real de História Portuguesa. His *Seram politico, abuso emendado, dividido em tres noites para divertimento dos curiosos*, first published in 1704, with a second edition in 1723, consists of three novelas in prose, interspersed with both serious and comic poetry in Portuguese and Spanish. Its thrust is a critical attack on the excesses of the baroque style, from a baroque perspective. A great deal of Fr. Lucas' secular literary output was left unpublished; with the recent revival of interest in late seventeenth- and early eighteenth-century Portuguese literature in general, and in Fr. Lucas in particular, some of his unpublished poetry and prose has begun to be published in critical editions.

FIRST EDITION. LIMITED to 300 copies, all numbered and signed by the author, of which only 150 were offered for sale; the present copy is number 160. A facsimile reprint appeared in 1971. This is the definitive study of Portuguese engravers, with biographical information for each and a list of published works.

Second edition of this scholarly work by a famous Portuguese physician on the history of medicine in Portugal and its colonies during the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, originally published by Temas e Debates in 2013. Chapters include research on historic techniques for teaching medicine, diseases of the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries (with special focus on tropical and exotic sicknesses), sicknesses and diseases onboard the Portuguese ships, and historic hospitals that were established in the Portuguese colonies (such as in Ormus, Japan, Goa, Cochim [Kochi], Mozambique, Malacca, and Brazil). There are 12 unpaginated leaves with color illustrations of archaic procedures, photographs of medical equipment from the period, photographs of historic hospitals, and the portraits of important figures in medicine during the period. This is the work's second printing, dated January 2016. It appears that the content is not different from the first edition (2013). Círculo de Leitores has reprinted this title, and suggests that it is offers insight as a supplement to the two-volume *Dicionário da Expansão Portuguesa*. SPECIAL LIST 238
